Annie E. Casey Selects KVC for Trauma Research

KVC is proud and honored to have been chosed to receive a five-year, \$830,000 grant from the Annie E. Casey Foundation. The foundation is a private charitable organization, dedicated to helping build better futures for disadvantaged children in the United States. The grant will support *Bridging the Way Home*, to support the emotional and behavioral needs of children who experience serious barriers to permanency.

With this grant, KVC will further it's work with Trauma Systems Therapy (TST), a method of providing care to children who have experienced severe abuse and neglect. We will consult with Glenn Saxe, M.D., Chair and Clinical Professor of Adolescent and Child Psychiatry at NYU Medical Center. Our staff will create a manual for clinicians and develop training materials for our outpatient and residential therapists. KVC foster parents, case managers and Child Placing staff will be trained on TST, which will incorporate TST into everything we do.

KVC staff will research the effects of TST on children and address how a child's mental health contributes to a stable placement in a foster home and reunification with a child's family. The outcomes of this national research will make significant contributions to the child welfare field.

KVC has one of the country's largest continuums of care utilizing Trauma Systems Therapy.

Valuable KVC Collaborations

Dr. Barbara Atkinson has devoted her life devoted to science and research. As the University of Kansas Medical Center's first woman Executive Vice Chancellor, she oversees a faculty and staff of 2,500 and a \$317 million annual budget. During KVC's recent 40th anniversary celebration, Dr. Atkinson was honored as one of our 40 heroes.

KVC partners with KUMC on a variety of initiatives. KU's Division of Child and Adolescent Psychiatry offers a two-year accredited residency program. Graduates develop the knowledge and skills necessary to respond to a great number of young people suffering with a broad range of emotional problems. KU medical school students work with KVC during their

residency as child and adolescent psychiatry fellows.

In addition, KU faculty member Sharon Cain, M.D., helped establish KVC's telepsychiatry program. KU shares Grand Rounds continuing education program with KVC via a video link. The Paul Laybourne Symposium, another continuing education program, is offered to doctors, nurses, social workers and other clinicians participating in mental health care for children and adolescents.

KVC values these collaborations and recognizes Dr. Atkinson for her leadership and commitment to this community partnership.

Wheatland Forges Community Partnerships

KVC's Wheatland Psychiatric Hospital in Hays, Kansas, just completed its first year of service to the residents of central and western Kansas. Wheatland serves on average more than 18 patients per day.

The community of Hays has welcomed KVC with many community Partnerships. Partner organizations include USD 489, Community Mental Health Centers, district courts and juvenile authorities. The Hess Clinic has been an invaluable source of medical support and consultation. KVC refers all medical emergencies to the Hays Medical Center, and this relationship has been met with mutual respect and professional support.

Unified School District 489 administration has been very helpful and cooperative in supporting KVC in the education of children while in care. Two classrooms, a computer lab and library are staffed by two teachers. All instruction is accredited, which allows students to transfer educational credits.

KVC has received several gifts from local donors of recreational equipment, including two Nintendo Wii stations, and air hockey and foosball tables to allow youth who have earned privileges to

Childhood Trauma Seminar Benefits Many

Hundreds of people who work in the behavioral healthcare field learned first-hand about the effects of trauma on infants. Joy Osofsky, Ph.D., presented *Trauma through the Eyes of a Child,* a two-day seminar in April at the Ball Conference Center in Olathe, Kansas. Dr. Osofsky is a clinical and developmental psychologist and Barbara Lemann Professor in the Departments of Pediatrics and Psychiatry at Louisiana State University Health Sciences Center in New Orleans.

Children who experience trauma are often significantly more reactive to their surroundings and may have increased emotional needs. The seminar was designed specifically for infant and toddler program staff members who can help advocate for services that include traumafocused therapy for young children and their families, and was open to KVC staff and professionals throughout the community.



Clarence Small was recently honored by United Way of Wyandotte County for his work with KVC's Prairie Ridge Hospital. Clarence and his friends bring uplifting music, praise dancing, gospel rap and inspiration messages to the children in residential treatment.
